The community is served by a modern, full-service hospital, a well-regarded public school system, and access to all the public infrastructure necessary to support business start-up, relocation and expansion.







Our Climate

Lander's geography and mild climate offers residents full opportunity to enjoy the four seasons:

- One of the least windiest cities in continental U.S. (average 5.6 mph)
- Over 240 sunny days a year
- Elevation of 5,357 feet
- 13.4" in precipitation annually
- 108" of snowfall annually
- Average temperature in the July is 86 degrees

Safe Community

Lander's crime rate is 15% below the national average. Many families who move here indicate they feel Lander is a safe place to raise their children.

Outdoors

The Wind River Mountains outside of Lander offer some of the best backpacking, fishing, climbing and hunting in North America. Nearly everyone in Lander lists outdoor recreation

among their favorite pastimes, and many say the mountains and deserts that surround the town are the primary reason they choose to live here.

Lander is seven miles from Sinks Canyon State Park. The canyon is best known for the Sinks and Rise of the Popo Agie River, where the river disappears into the mountainside and then mysteriously reappears a half-mile downstream in a large pool filled with giant brown trout. You commonly see bighorn sheep and deer in Sinks Canyon, and if you are lucky, you may spot an elusive mountain lion.

Lander has a wide-range of quality restaurants and lodging. You can eat pad thai, burritos, or sit outside on a deck to enjoy a great American steak with locally brewed beer or a fresh green salad at one of the many venues found in town. Lander also has a number of quality motels known for their friendly ambiance and unique charm.

Eagle Bronze Foundry has expanded to 45 employees, opened foundaries in Mexico and Italy and a new Eagle Bronze Gallery on Lander's Main Street. The company is renowned for quality and delivers fine art casting to clients throughout the U.S., Canada, Japan, Europe and the Middle East.

MUSEUMS



The Lander museum site offers visitors a multi-faceted opportunity to experience regional history at its best.

With over 10,000 square feet of display space, the newly completed Fremont County Pioneer Museum provides an impressive assortment of regional historical artifacts in a traditional museum format. The museum is surrounded by the Museum of the American West's "Pioneer Village," which includes a number of historic, restored buildings from the valley's pioneer days for visitors to explore.

The Traveler's Welcome Center offers travelers a comfortable and safe facility to relax and get off the beaten path. While resting, visitors can enjoy Lander's culture and history at its museums or take in the small shops and restaurants along Main Street.

Culture HISTORY &

Lander has evolved into a modern community but the town retains the ambience of its colorful western past and rich cultural legacy.

Wind River Indian Reservation

Lander is a proud neighbor of the Wind River Reservation. The reservation was created in 1868 and is home to the Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapaho tribes. One of the area's most famous ancestors, Sacajawea who led Lewis and Clark on their expedition across the continent, is buried on the reservation outside of Fort Washakie.

Both the Eastern Shoshone and the Northern Arapaho have an active cultural life and throughout the summer, the reservation is alive with the sound of pounding drums and stamping feet as powwow season brings dancing, horseracing, gaming and other traditional forms of entertainment to the Wind River Valley.



South Pass City Historical Trail Corridor

In the mid-to-late 1800s, hundreds of thousands of pioneers traveled over South Pass en route to California, Oregon and Utah. Miners in search of gold followed the settlers and the towns of South Pass City and Atlantic City were established to feed, house and entertain the men who followed the boom. Today, South Pass City is open to visitors seeking to step back

into time. Atlantic City is a great place to stop and eat and enjoy the cool mountain air. You can also tour the Historic Carissa Gold Mine, which has recently been opened for visitors.

Children's Museum

The Lander Children's Museum offers a variety of hands-on exhibits and a friendly environment for children of all ages.



Art Center

The Art Center opened in 2002 with the help of local artists and a rural development grant. The center provides space for exhibitions and classes, and promotes the arts in the Lander community.

City of Bronze

Lander is known to many as the "City of Bronze." It's easy to understand why when you see the many bronze statues decorating the town's main thoroughfare. Lander also offers several art galleries for visitors to purchase quality pieces of art from well-known local artists.

Stub Farlow

Wyoming's license plates display a rendition of a man on a bucking horse.

This man is the famous bucking-horse rodeo champion Stub Farlow who lived here in Lander.



In 2004, the local Mothers of PreSchoolers (MOPS) in Lander had a vision to build a modern playground facility for their children. One year later, these determined mothers completed their fundraising goal of more than \$200,000.

The dream playground was constructed in 2005 by hundreds of community volunteers. Modeled after Lander's Main Street circa 1880s, the playground includes one of Lander's first branding slogans "Where the Rails End and the Trails Begin."

NOLS



The National Outdoor Leadership School (NOLS) is the world's premier outdoor education organization. NOLS takes students of all ages on extended wilderness expeditions to teach outdoor skills, develop leadership, and teach about the natural environment. Lander was selected as the location for the non-profit school because of the community's easy access to the Wind River Mountains. Over the last 45 years, NOLS has expanded to 14 wilderness classroom locations around the world.

In 2009, NOLS was selected for the second year in a row as one of Outside Magazine's "Best Places to Work".

"NOLS is totally committed to Lander," says Bruce Palmer, the school's admission and marketing director. "It is an outdoorperson's mecca and an incredible community. A number of years ago we asked our staff and alumni where our new headquarters building should be located. The response was overwhelming: NOLS is Lander and Lander is NOLS!"

Events

From playing in the sun to cruising in the snow, Lander offers no shortage of events all year round.

4th of July

The largest event in Lander centers around our 4th of July Parade and the oldest paid Rodeo in the world. During this time, the population of Lander triples in size to about 20,000 people. For three days, the community enjoys an old-style rodeo complete with roping, bull riding, wild horse relays and barrel races. Then on July 4th, the Pioneer Days Parade brings the Old West back to life. After the parade, you can enjoy the Lander Rotary Club Buffalo Barbeque at City Park, with music and fun for all ages. To cap the fun, at night the sky over town lights up with fireworks displays from the city and private citizens celebrating the nation's birthday.

Community Concerts

Lander's Community Concert Series is the longest running series in Wyoming. Professional dancers, orchestras, bands, and many other entertainers from around the country will knock your socks off! The quality of these fine arts events will astound you.

The One Shot Antelope Hunt

The One Shot is held every year in September. Celebrities and politicians from around the country gather for this event, which celebrates the heritage of hunting. Representatives from the Eastern Shoshone Tribe begin the event with a traditional blessing and finish with the exciting "Legend of the Hunt" performance.

International Climber's Festival

Pack your bags, get stoked, and come to Lander for the best climber's festival in the world!

Every summer this event attracts top superstar climbers for parties, games, slideshows, movies and, of course, some climbing up at Sinks Canyon or Wild Iris.

Lander Brew Fest!

Looking for fun in the sun in June? You won't be disappointed with the Lander Brew Fest. This relaxing event attracts more than 15 different brewmasters to Lander City Park to show off their wares. There are taste tests, competitions, live music and great food to keep you entertained.

Heart of the West Art Show and Sale

Top artists from around the West converge every October in Lander for the Heart of the West Invitational Art Show and Sale. Attendees can enjoy watching while an artist paints a new piece of art, and can purchase artwork directly from the artist.

International Pedigree Stage Stop Dog Sled Race

The International Pedigree Stage Stop Dog Sled Race is the largest sled dog race in the lower 48 states. In January, top mushers and their



bands of fourlegged furry friends compete on the Lander leg of this multi-stage race. The race offers spectators the unique opportunity to
